NOTES AND COMMENTS

Following is the "Rest of the Story" so to speak. I asked Dean Roesner and Wes Shuster to pen me their memories about how the association was first born, then I pick up on the origins of the subsequent and existing organization.

Hi Fred,

Well, I just spent a whole evening looking over lots of stuff I have from people and myself about our days in VN. Amazing how emotional it all is, and how lightly we looked at it way back then, it sure seems a lot more serious now. Haven't thought of some of these things in quite awhile, really gets to you deep down. I don't know what I can add that isn't in the 4 newsletters. We had only two reunions, the first in Edwardsville, Illinois (St Louis) on Oct 3, 4, 5, of 1986. That one was really arranged by Duane "Tubby" Brudvig and it grew by phone calls from one person to another. The second one was in San Francisco, and was essentially put on by Joe Bilitzke, in July 88. Wes Schuster was the first President (elected at the first reunion) and did the first 3 newsletters. The association came about almost casually, during the first reunion. We were really all there because the current 281st was about to be deactivated and the colors retired, and the current 281st members thought it would be a good idea to have some of the original 281st people there. Paul Maledy was working near there and knew of the current 281st and started getting the word out. One thing led to another. All in all, the most credit for the first reunion idea and getting started was due to Tubby. Thanks, Dean

Fred.

Dean has recalled the flow of how it all started fairly well. I'd just like to point out this all started back in the "old days" before email. Tubby stared it by mail. He was my doorgunner (and a damn good one) and contacted me early in the process. I suggested he give me the addresses, he had and I put together a "newsletter" to create some interest and get the word out. This seemed to draw in some of the guys by a type of chain mail and by word of mouth.

Our first reunion was Intruders only. We had about 20 Intruders attend. We told a lot of war stories, drank beer and went out to the flight line of the 281st.

The second reunion was more of a family affair. Attendance wasn't much larger, about 25, but a lot of guys brought their families.

You might show the two reunion photos in your write up. We were better looking then. The Wolf Pack made up a good % of the first two reunions. It was probably due to Tubby & I coming from Wolf Pack (Joe Bilitzki was also Wolf Pack) and knew where some of the other guys were. Sadly some of our Wolf Pack brothers passed on after the second reunion; Bob George, Jim Bown and Steve Watson. All great guys. We were all together in 1969. Wes

My turn.....

At the 1997 VHPA annual reunion, my first after returning from overseas, I ran into Lance Ham, Wolf Pack 35 when I was the WP Platoon Leader. After a lot of back slapping and reminiscing he told me about the first Association and his trips to attend various gatherings. We talked about why the first association had dwindled and came to the conclusion that work, family and other obligations took precedence in most guys lives, quite understandably so. Lance then suggested that maybe I could give it a try, to revive the association... I mean me being retired and all and having all that time on my hands (yeah, right!) and the fact that many of our vets were getting older and retiring and that with the advent of email and the Internet, communication was so much easier. So I spent the next year thinking about how to go about it, educating myself about things like IRS code 501c (19) and the like, developing the Wolf Pack website, etc. Then came the 1998 VHPA gathering at Ft Worth.

At that reunion about 18 former 281st pilots got together for a little mini reunion and decided to attempt to put together the association. There were volunteers for temp positions and the hat was passed for initial operating costs. I ended up the "Secretary Pro-Tem", "Editor" of the

newsletter and responsible for the \$90 bucks collected. It was emphasized from the very first that the association would be "for all former personnel of the 281st Assault Helicopter Company and support elements", and thats the way its been. It was the general consensus that the initial organizing should be at VHPA gatherings as the most convenient and appropriate way to get things started. Then we decided that the VHPA 1999 Reunion at Nashville would be the time and the place to constitute the association, vote for officers, a constitution, by-laws, what-all. Although the reunion at Nashville was a pilot affair, there was nothing to preclude "anyone" from coming to the mini-reunion or to the reunion in general. So, the 281st Mini-Reunion at Nashville, was to open to all 281st (and who but Bill Purdy and Ken Boling would show up!).

In order to try to harness the enthusiasm and keep a modicum of control we formed an Organizing Committee to put together a program for the Nashville meeting where we formally organized and constituted the 281st Association. The committee members were; Fred Mentzer, Joe Bilitzke, Jack Green, Brent H. Gourley, Jack Mayhew, Bob Mitchell, Jerry Montoya, Robert L. Williams, and Corky Corcoran

So there, now you have the "Rest of the Story". How the 281st Assault Helicopter Company Association came into being, then and now. By the way, if you're curious about how our Nashville "constitutional" meeting went down, there exists a video of the entire affair shot by Steve Mathews. Ask me about it next month at the Reunion. - Fred

BOUNCING ALONG IN MY CHARLIE MODEL

I used to love Delta missions. For one we got to live in a tent instead of a wooden building with screen windows. Outhouses were much nicer than those porcelain things back in Nha Trang. And the food, well heck, who wouldn't enjoy eating Salisbury Steak off a segmented plastic tray and drinking green Kool Aid from a canteen cup to a meal in some Special Forces mess hall. But mostly I liked it because I could have a lot of fun flying. We could violate a few principles, such as...We could fly low level...We could shoot at people...We could run out of fuel. Yep, this is one of those stories.

It was August 10, 1969, a Mai Loc Delta, and I think my CE was either Daryl Evanghelo or Beetle Bailey, I do remember the aircraft, it was 167, and those two guys are the crewmembers I remember the most so lets pretend they were both crewing that day. We had just gone on a Delta infil followed by a Delta exfil and we shot nary one round. No rockets either. Cold missions, routine, boring. But as we departed the AO my 20 minute light illuminated, and as we approached Vandegrif for fuel it was burning steady. I turned us all on final and told the tower we were a flight of two inbound for fuel when KABOOM, a big old explosion happened on the

other end of the runway. I turned to look at the tower and those guys were unassing the ladder heading for something less conspicuous. Having no option but to get more gas I did a reverse Brian Paine maneuver and landed directly on that refuel pad/revetment and yelled at Daryl/Beetle to get moving. I didn't have to tell them twice, they were scrambling to get that nozzle in the port. But before they had even pumped one gallon, KABOOM, another explosion, this one about halfway between the first one and our current location. Obviously those guys had studied bracketing in mortar school That did kick D/B into high gear and they began pumping but also staring thru the doors at the site of the last explosion when KABOOM, another one, and this one was even closer than the last one. By then all of us were staring at the runway, but we also were NOT staring at the gas gauge. We never took off with more than 900 pounds of JP4 due to weight limitations and even though we were in a hurry we seemed to have forgotten that little tidbit, and suddenly fuel was coming out of the port onto D/B's boots. The gauge was max'ed out. I yelled, D/B yelled, my co-pilot yelled (Jim Holt, not a big deal, he was only the guy who wrote my OER). Tossing the offending fuel hose on the ground D/B hopped in and I cranked up the throttle and added some pitch. Oops, we maybe got light on the skids. We had over-grossed the aircraft. I tried again. Good old 167 shuddered and flopped a bit from right to left and settled right back down. I hollared something unintelligible to D/B while my CP was yelling something worse at me, and I also noticed my wingman was similarly in a minor overweight position. D/B, not being dumb, grabbed an armload apiece of something heavy and headed for the runway, this PSP strip about 50 years behind us. I once again cranked the throttle to 6600 and added some collective and lo and behold, we hovered. For about 3 feet. We settled down to terra firma in some manner akin to a controlled hovering autorotation. I thought this was better than sitting there so I tried again. Same results. KABOOM, there went another one. It was then that I found out how fast I could bring an overgrossed Charlie Model Huey to a 3 foot hover and slap her 4-5 feet sideways and back onto the ground again without crashing, and we eventually made it to the runway. D/B, or was it B/D, elbowed each other out of the way and jumped inside and away we went, bouncing down Vandegrif's PSP runway for all we were worth, gaining a bit more airspeed and altitude with each bounce, somehow managing to elude those little imperfections in the PSP that always seemed to be in guest of a skid shoe to snag until we finally bounced high enough to remain airborne. And we managed also to hop over the little mountain range and alight back at Mai Loc where we all treated ourselves to a rusty can of Carling Black Label. Beer never tasted so good. And that is NO Shit. - Jeff

And how about this? Our very own Joe Bilitzke has finally hung up his bars! Not necessarily voluntary..... father time moved in and now he be just another "old guy".....

Today marks the end of an era and the beginning of another. Chief Warrant Officer Four Joe Bilitzke will hang up his wings & boots after 42 years of service to our nation to include participating in three wars. Joe started his career with the 281st in January of 1968 and completed it as a member of the Wolf Pack in January 1969. Following Vietnam he went on to become very successful in the business world and to marry his lovely wife Darlene while remaining active in the Army Aviation reserves. When his unit was



recalled for Desert Storm I Joe was on his way to Iraq and when the current war started he was back in uniform for the duration. This time he sold his business and moved into a hotel close to the unit HQ where has spent the past 3+ years. During this time Joe has served as president of the VHPA and continues to co-chair the VHPA annual reunion committee. In addition he had a

big hand in getting the 281st Association off the ground and kept us straight for the first few years.

I was asked by a reporter doing a story on Joe to summarize his strong points and achievements. My response, simply stated, was that Joe Bilitzke is a true professional soldier who always performed his duty in a quiet manner that earned him the respect of all of us who has served with him. Joe leaves the Army as a highly decorated Master Army Aviator. (Included in his awards is the Purple Heart earned in the 281st AHC While flying with Don Torrini).

Now that Joe is free from the Army and the business world we look forward to his resumption of a major leadership role in the association. Joe's email address and phone number is listed below.
