



***This following is the latest update (12/03/08) on the 281<sup>st</sup> Monument Committee for the Airborne and Special Operations Museum (ASOMF) from Ken Smith, Senior Member at Large and Chairman of the 281<sup>st</sup> Monument Committee....***

I had not spoken to Paul Galloway at the ASOMF (ASOMF) since I submitted the artwork back in late September when I requested that he complete the final version for the inscription on the 281<sup>st</sup> Monument. Paul was waiting for me to contact him and tell him to move forward with the order and send him a check for \$3800 (\$3,750 for the monument and \$50 for the artwork). Paul is very busy now also since he is the acting Executive Director of the ASOMF.

I have also been very busy and literally on the road or in an airplane for most of the month of October and November including a mad dash across the country helping my daughter, 2nd LT Christina Smith, USAF (graduated US Air Force Academy May 2007) to relocate from Vandenberg AFB, CA to McGuire AFB, NJ. On that trip I was fortunate to have a chance to have dinner with Don Torrini and Gary Stagman near the Crown Plaza since I decided to let LT Smith complete the last leg of the trip on her own and I flew home from STL. I logged more than 4,000 road miles and another 5,000 airline miles in the scant time of 30 days spanning 10/10/08 to 11/10/08!

The artwork is now complete and I have shared it with my fellow committee members and the Executive Board (EB), and I will be requesting a check from our Treasurer Fred Beck so that the monument can be ordered. You may recall that it takes about six months for the monument company to complete the work. There is one minor caveat that Paul made to me about the artwork that is out of his control and ours too. If you look at the Intruder crest you will see the triangle patch in the lower right of the patch. You cannot actually see it in the picture (Figure 1), but there are words that are in the double lined border that you can make out in the blow up picture of the triangle (Figure2).



Paul is not sure that the monument company will be able to get these to appear on the monument itself given the scale and the difficulty of making those engravings. There is really nothing we can do to ensure that the words are there so we will just have to wait and see what the monument company tells us is possible. Other than that the project is a go!

The other issue that has started to emerge around the 281<sup>st</sup> Monument Project is what kind of dedication ceremony we would like to have when we decide to have the monument set in place. There has been some talk of holding the 2010 Reunion in Fayetteville, but that has only been floated as an idea at this point. The possible reunion facilities in Fayetteville are much more limited, and they are likely to be more expensive than St. Louis. I will be discussing the possibility of exploring this with the EB and our reunion experts. If there are members with feedback or opinions on this, please email me or our President, Frank Little, [fwlittl@windstream.net](mailto:fwlittl@windstream.net) to express your opinion on this. For those of you that don't know where Fayetteville, NC is; it is about an hour southwest of Raleigh, NC and there are many activities and things to do in the area if we should decide to do a reunion there in 2010.
